QUESTION 1: LAW PROPOSED BY INITIATIVE PETITION

Do you approve of a law summarized below, on which no vote was taken by the Senate or the House of Representatives on or before May 6, 2014?

SUMMARY

This proposed law would eliminate the requirement that the state's gasoline tax, which was 24 cents per gallon as of September 2013, (1) be adjusted every year by the percentage change in the Consumer Price Index over the preceding year, but (2) not be adjusted below 21.5 cents per gallon.

A YES VOTE would eliminate the requirement that the state's gas tax be adjusted annually based on the Consumer Price Index.

A NO VOTE would make no change in the laws regarding the gas tax.

QUESTION 2: LAW PROPOSED BY INITIATIVE PETITION

Do you approve of a law summarized below, on which no vote was taken by the Senate or the House of Representatives on or before May 6, 2014?

SUMMARY

This proposed law would expand the state's beverage container deposit law, also known as the Bottle Bill, to require deposits on containers for all non-alcoholic non-carbonated drinks in liquid form intended for human consumption, except beverages primarily derived from dairy products, infant formula, and FDA approved medicines. The proposed law would not cover containers made of paper-based biodegradable material and aseptic multi-material packages such as juice boxes or pouches.

The proposed law would require the state Secretary of Energy and Environmental Affairs (EEA) to adjust the container deposit amount every five years to reflect (to the nearest whole cent) changes in the consumer price index, but the value could not be set below five cents.

The proposed law would increase the minimum handling fee that beverage distributors must pay dealers for each properly returned empty beverage container, which was 2½ cents as of September 2013, to 3½ cents. It would also increase the minimum handling fee that bottlers must pay distributors and dealers for each properly returned empty reusable beverage container, which was 1 cent as of September 2013, to 3½ cents. The Secretary of EEA would review the fee amounts every five years and make appropriate adjustments to reflect changes in the consumer price index as well as changes in the costs incurred by redemption centers. The proposed law defines a redemption center as any business whose primary purpose is the redemption of beverage containers and that is not ancillary to any other business.

The proposed law would direct the Secretary of EEA to issue regulations allowing small dealers to seek exemptions from accepting empty deposit containers. The proposed law would define small dealer as any person or business, including the operator of a vending machine, who sells beverages in beverage containers to consumers, with a contiguous retail space of 3,000 square feet or less, excluding office and stock room space; and fewer than four locations under the same ownership in the Commonwealth. The proposed law would require that the regulations consider at least the health, safety, and convenience of the public, including the distribution of dealers and redemption centers by population or by distance or both.

The proposed law would set up a state Clean Environment Fund to receive certain unclaimed container deposits. The Fund would be used, subject to appropriation by the state Legislature, to support programs such as the proper management of solid waste, water resource protection, parkland, urban forestry, air quality and climate protection.

The proposed law would allow a dealer, distributor, redemption center or bottler to refuse to accept any beverage container that is not

marked as being refundable in Massachusetts.

The proposed law would take effect on April 22, 2015.

A YES VOTE would expand the state's beverage container deposit law to require deposits on containers for all non-alcoholic, non-carbonated drinks with certain exceptions, increase the associated handling fees, and make other changes to the law.

A NO VOTE would make no change in the laws regarding beverage container deposits.

OUESTION 3: LAW PROPOSED BY INITIATIVE PETITION

Do you approve of a law summarized below, on which no vote was taken by the Senate or the House of Representatives on or before May 6, 2014?

SUMMARY

This proposed law would (1) prohibit the Massachusetts Gaming Commission from issuing any license for a casino or other gaming establishment with table games and slot machines, or any license for a gaming establishment with slot machines; (2) prohibit any such casino or slots gaming under any such licenses that the Commission might have issued before the proposed law took effect; and (3) prohibit wagering on the simulcasting of live greyhound races.

The proposed law would change the definition of "illegal gaming" under Massachusetts law to include wagering on the simulcasting of live greyhound races, as well as table games and slot machines at Commission-licensed casinos, and slot machines at other Commission-licensed gaming establishments. This would make those types of gaming subject to existing state laws providing criminal penalties for, or otherwise regulating or prohibiting, activities involving illegal gaming.

The proposed law states that if any of its parts were declared invalid, the other parts would stay in effect.

A YES VOTE would prohibit casinos, any gaming establishment with slot machines, and wagering on simulcast greyhound races.

A NO VOTE would make no change in the current laws regarding gaming.

QUESTION 4: LAW PROPOSED BY INITIATIVE PETITION

Do you approve of a law summarized below, on which no vote was taken by the Senate or the House of Representatives on or before May 6, 2014?

SUMMARY

This proposed law would entitle employees in Massachusetts to earn and use sick time according to certain conditions.

Employees who work for employers having eleven or more employees could earn and use up to 40 hours of paid sick time per calendar year, while employees working for smaller employers could earn and use up to 40 hours of unpaid sick time per calendar year.

An employee could use earned sick time if required to miss work in order (1) to care for a physical or mental illness, injury or medical condition affecting the employee or the employee's child, spouse, parent, or parent of a spouse; (2) to attend routine medical appointments of the employee or the employee's child, spouse, parent, or parent of a spouse; or (3) to address the effects of domestic violence on the employee or the employee's dependent child. Employees would earn one hour of sick time for every 30 hours worked, and would begin accruing those hours on the date of hire or on July 1, 2015, whichever is later. Employees could begin to use earned sick time on the 90th day after hire.

The proposed law would cover both private and public employers, except that employees of a particular city or town would be covered only if, as required by the state constitution, the proposed law were made applicable by local or state legislative vote or by appropriation of sufficient funds to pay for the benefit. Earned paid sick time would be compensated at the same hourly rate paid to the employee when the sick time is used.

Employees could carry over up to 40 hours of unused sick time to the next calendar year, but could not use more than 40 hours in a calendar year. Employers would not have to pay employees for unused sick time at the end of their employment. If an employee missed work for a reason eligible for earned sick time, but agreed with the employer to work the same number of hours or shifts in the same or next pay period, the employee would not have to use earned sick time for the missed time, and the employer would not have to pay for that missed time. Employers would be prohibited from requiring such an employee to work additional hours to make up for missed time, or to find a replacement employee.

Employers could require certification of the need for sick time if an employee used sick time for more than 24 consecutively scheduled work hours. Employers could not delay the taking of or payment for earned sick time because they have not received the certification. Employees would have to make a good faith effort to notify the employer in advance if the need for earned sick time is foreseeable.

Employers would be prohibited from interfering with or retaliating based on an employee's exercise of earned sick time rights, and from retaliating based on an employee's support of another employee's exercise of such rights.

The proposed law would not override employers' obligations under any contract or benefit plan with more generous provisions than those in the proposed law. Employers that have their own policies providing as much paid time off, usable for the same purposes and under the same conditions, as the proposed law would not be required to provide additional paid sick time.

The Attorney General would enforce the proposed law, using the same enforcement procedures applicable to other state wage laws, and employees could file suits in court to enforce their earned sick time rights. The Attorney General would have to prepare a multilingual notice regarding the right to earned sick time, and employers would be required to post the notice in a conspicuous

location and to provide a copy to employees. The state Executive Office of Health and Human Services, in consultation with the Attorney General, would develop a multilingual outreach program to inform the public of the availability of earned sick time.

The proposed law would take effect on July 1, 2015, and states that if any of its parts were declared invalid, the other parts would stay in effect.

A YES VOTE would entitle employees in Massachusetts to earn and use sick time according to certain conditions.

A NO VOTE would make no change in the laws regarding earned sick time.

OUESTION 5

Shall the Town of Northbridge be allowed to assess an additional \$311,000 in real estate and personal property taxes for the purpose of funding the following capital purchases for the School Department: pick-up truck replacement; kitchen repairs at the Balmer School; air conditioner replacement for the Middle School auditorium; locker room HVAC unit replacement for the Middle School; building and grounds security cameras and key card/fob boxes at the High School, Middle School, Balmer School, and Northbridge Elementary School; and technology switch additions and replacements at the High School, Middle School, Balmer School, and Northbridge Elementary School, for the fiscal year beginning July 1, 2014?

OUESTION 6

Shall the Town of Northbridge be allowed to assess an additional \$300,000 in real estate and personal property taxes for the purpose of funding a road maintenance and repair program for the fiscal year beginning July 1, 2014?

And you are directed to serve this warrant by posting attested copies thereof at the Whitinsville Post office in Whitinsville and Brian's Restaurant in Linwood, in Precinct 1; Office of Polyfoam Corp., Gary's Variety and the Northbridge Post Office in Northbridge, all in Precinct 2; Town Clerk's Office and 1Quickstop in Whitinsville in Precinct 3; and the VFW Hall [875 Hill Street] and Town Hall Annex in Whitinsville in Precinct 4; seven (7) days at least before the time and place of meeting aforesaid.

HEREOF FAIL NOT, and make return of this warrant with your doings thereon, to the Town Clerk, at the time and place of said voting.

THE ALCOHOLIC BEVERAGES CONTROL COMMISSION ("ABCC") ADVISORY M.G.L. c. 138, §15 OFF-PREMISES RETAIL LICENSEES SUNDAY OPENING TIME ALLOWED AT 10:00 A.M.

Effective October 23, 2014¹, off-premises retail alcoholic beverages licensees (M.G.L. c. 138, §15) will be permitted to sell alcoholic beverages beginning at 10:00 a.m. on Sundays. Although under the law, these licensees are entitled as a matter of right to open at 10:00 a.m. and as such do not need the approval of the Local Licensing Authorities, licensees must notify the Local Licensing Authorities about the change of hours.

The simplest way for licensees to effectuate this change is to follow the process outlined in the CHANGE OF HOURS Application which may be found on our website at http://www.mass.gov/abcc/pdf/forms/nofeetransmittal.pdf. Licensees should use this form to notify the Local Licensing Authority of the change in hours and attach a corporate vote authorizing the change. Upon receipt of this request, the Local Licensing Authority must approve it. The Local Licensing Authority should forward an approved "Form 43" with the additional Sunday hours of sale to the ABCC for each licensee affected.

As mentioned above, this law does not go into effect until October 23, 2014. All licensees should ensure that sales of alcoholic beverages take place only on the days and hours approved by the Local Licensing Authority. Licensees who fail to notify the Local Licensing Authority about the change to their hours are prohibited from making sales at an earlier time than those permitted on the face of their license.

As always, all licensees must ensure that they are in compliance with the Laws of the Commonwealth of Massachusetts, and that sales of alcoholic beverages take place only as authorized by applicable law. 



To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate and/or transfer from available funds the following sums of money and authorize the payment of prior year bills; or take any other action relative thereto.

ARTICLE 2: (Board of Selectmen)

To see if the Town will vote to amend the votes taken under Article 3 of the 2014 Spring Session of the Annual Town Meeting (May 6, 2014), appropriations and transfers under the Omnibus Budget Article, to raise and appropriate, and/or to transfer a sum or sums of money from the undesignated fund balance (free cash) and/or the Health Insurance Stabilization Fund to supplement appropriations under the Omnibus Budget Article; or take any other action relative thereto.

If such contracts are to be approved, individual consumers would retain the option not to participate and to choose any alternative service they desire; and

Be it further resolved, that the Board of Selectmen may establish, and/or appoint representatives for, a committee to oversee such independent or joint action.

ARTICLE 6: (Board of Selectmen)

To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate and/or transfer from available funds and/or borrow a sum of money for the purchase and installation of water meters and associated equipment, including a

ARTICLE 7: (Board of Selectmen)

To see if the Town will vote to approve a Tax Payment Agreement pursuant to the provisions of MGL Chapter 59, Section 38H(b), and Chapter 164, Section 1, or any other enabling authority, for a certain sum and a certain term of years, between the Town and the property owner for real property and personal property relating to a Renewable Energy Generation Facility on the land located on Lasell Road known as Oakhurst Farm and shown on Assessors' Map 1, as Parcel 97 [containing approximately 11.19 acres] and Assessors' Map 1, as Parcel 98 [containing approximately 9.40 acres]; or take any other action relative thereto.

ARTICLE 8: (Board of Selectmen)

To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Board of Selectmen to enter into an Intermunicipal Agreement with Town of Sutton for the expansion of the sanitary sewer on Main Street in Whitinsville; or take any other action relative thereto.

ARTICLE 9: (Board of Selectmen)

ARTICLE 11: (Planning Board)

To see if the Town will vote to amend the Northbridge Zoning Bylaw, Chapter 173 of the Code of Northbridge, Section 173-20 [Table of Height and Bulk Regulations] by (1) increasing the maximum permitted height in the I-1 and I-2 (Industrial) zones from 30 and 45 feet respectively to 60 feet and (2) increasing the maximum permitted height (stories) in the I-1 & I-2 (Industrial) zones from 2 and 3 stories respectively to 4 stories, as shown below:



Policy for Service of Alcoholic Beverages under the "Bring Your Own Bottle" Provisions

The establishment requesting to be allowed to serve alcohol under the "BYOB" provisions agree to abide by all legal standards to ensure safe and proper service to patrons in accordance with all the guidelines and laws set forth by MA General Laws; the Alcoholic Beverages Control Commission and the Rules and Regulations of the Town of Northbridge governing establishments pursuant to MA General Laws Chapter 138.


- 1: The establishment is responsible for training employees in the correct procedures pertaining to this policy.
- 2: Alcoholic beverages are limited to beer or wine.
- 3: Alcoholic beverages are to be consumed inside the premises.
- 4: No alcoholic beverages are to be consumed by any person under the age of 21 in violation of MA General Laws, Chapter 138, Section 34. It will be the responsibility of the establishment to ensure that patrons who consume alcoholic beverages on the premises are 21 years of age.
- 5: Alcoholic beverages are not to be consumed on the premises by an intoxicated person.
- 6: The establishment cannot charge the consumer either directly or indirectly to consume alcoholic beverages on the premises including a service fee, glass fee, table fee or corking fee.
- 7: No alcoholic beverages may be served or handled by the employees. This includes storing, refrigerating, or pouring alcoholic beverages.
- 8: No alcoholic beverages may be purchased or provided from within the premises.
- 9: Patrons cannot leave the premises with an open container of alcohol in violation of Town Bylaw Chapter 9 section 201. A patron who wishes to remove their unfinished bottle of wine from the premises must have the premises ensure that the bottle is securely resealed and placed in a one-time tamper proof transparent bag as allowed under MGL Chapter 138 section 12.
- 10: All alcoholic beverages must be removed from the unlicensed premises by the person who carried them in.
- 11: Any establishment who in the conduct of his/her business either directly or through his/her agent causes or permits any violations of state or local statutes or regulations under the "Bring Your Own Bottle" Policy or permits any other illegalities shall be subject to a hearing on the alleged violation for possible modification, suspension or revocation of their Common Victualler license before the Board of Selectmen, Local Licensing Authority for the Town of Northbridge.

Highlights from the TOWN CLERK'S OFFICE

For the period July 1 – September 30, 2014

1. The Board of Registrars met on August 18th and appointed the election officials for the period of September 2014 – August 2015. (The Board of Registrars did the appointing this year, because the Board of Selectmen was not meeting during the State-required period for the appointment of election workers).

Comments: Throughout every year, we lose at least one election worker, due to relocation, new life-style (i.e travelling, babysitting), health problems, etc. Hence, we are constantly recruiting new workers and schedule them to work an election as soon as possible to ensure that we have a trained pool of workers to call upon election after election.

2. As reported last time, the State Vital Records Department was preparing to launch the electronic filing of death certificates. The electronic filing of death certificates was launched on September 1st. Linda and I were confident about handling the process for the electronic filing of death certificates, as we had participated in the State's training methods (memos, webinars, sandboxes, and conferences). From our end, it is going fine.

Comments: The electronic filing of death certificates DOES NOT AFFECT the public in any way. I report on it, because it is a major change in the internal world of vital records and statistics, but, again, it does not affect the public in any way.

3. State Primary was held on September 9th. All went well. **Comments:** Turnout was 14%.

- 4. We are now preparing for the State Election, which will be held on Tuesday, November 4th. Absentee ballots are in, and we have mailed the absentee ballots to voters who have already requested absentee ballots.
- 5. Linda and I attended the Fall *Massachusetts City and Town Clerks Conference* in Springfield last week. We both attended the Elections class.
 - **Comments:** Education is very important to us, whether it is for something new or a review. In my opinion, it is mandatory that we keep ourselves well-informed in the many areas in which we have responsibilities.
- 6. In July, Linda began her first year of a three-year, week-long program for credits toward her Certified Municipal Clerk (CMC) designation.
 Comments: The Certified Municipal Clerk designation is one of the two professional designations granted through the International Institute of Municipal Clerks. The Certified Municipal Clerk program is designed to enhance the job performance of the attendee in small and large municipalities. The CMC designation is achieved through a points system, and points are acquired through extensive education programs. The week-long program is held on the campus of Plymouth State University in New Hampshire.
- 7. I started pursuing my Master Municipal Clerk designation (MMC). Comments: The Master Municipal Clerk program is the second of the two professional designations through the International Institute of Municipal Clerks. It is an advanced continuing education program, and it, too, is achieved through a points system.
- 8. 2015 Census: We have done the preliminary steps required for the Annual Town Census. It will be mailed the first week in January, 2015.




