BOARD OF SELECTMEN'S MEETING SPRING ANNUAL TOWN MEETING

May 3, 2022

A meeting of the Board of Selectmen was called to order at 6:30 PM by Chairman Charles Ampagoomian, Jr. at the Northbridge Middle School Auditorium, 171 Linwood Avenue, Whitinsville, MA. **Present:** Board Members: Melia, Athanas, Collins, Cannon, and Ampagoomian.

Also Present: Adam D. Gaudette, Town Manager and Sharon Susienka, Exec. Asst. to the Town Manager.

Town Meeting Business. Town Manager Gaudette advised Board members that several changes have been made to the motions for Articles 1, 2, 19, 21, and 22 and therefore the Board would need to revote those particular articles. He said the Finance Committee will be doing the same at their meeting this evening. Article 1 (Bills of a prior year): He mentioned an additional outstanding bill was added to the category of Non-Departmental/Property & Liability Insurance in the amount of \$128.94 and payable to Cabot Risk Strategies, LLC. Article 2 (FY'22 Budget Transfers): First, Mr. Gaudette noted additional funds were needed for the Fire and Ambulance budget line items and the funds would come from Line 26 Veterans Services and allocated as follows: Line 15A Fire Personnel - \$20,000; Line 15B Fire Expenses - \$15,000; and Line 16B Ambulance Expenses - \$15,000. Next, he said the number for Line 21C Snow/Ice Personnel would increase from \$300,000 to \$343,304. Article 19 (Capital Items): The Town Manager mentioned there was a change to the item entitled Upton Town Line Guardrail from \$3,489 to \$11,156. Article 21 (Fire Station funding): Mr. Gaudette mentioned the town needs an additional \$3,755,182 to complete the Fire Station Project as originally planned. He explained the increase is due to the dramatic rise in construction costs (materials and labor) as the result of the post-pandemic economy, the war with Ukraine, and increased fuel costs. Article 22 (Transfer to Stabilization): The Town Manager stated there are no funds available to transfer into Stabilization and therefore this article will be passed over tonight. There being no further items to address, a motion/Mr. Ampagoomian, seconded/Mr. Melia to support the changes to Articles 1, 2, 19, and 21 and to pass over Article 22 all as noted above. Vote yes/Collins, Athanas, Cannon, Ampagoomian, and Melia.

There being no further business before the Board at this time, a motion/Mr. Melia seconded/Mr. Athanas, to adjourn the Selectmen's Meeting at the conclusion of the Spring Annual Town Meeting this evening. Vote yes/Collins, Athanas, Cannon, Ampagoomian, and Melia.

Know all Men by These Presents,

That the Town of Northbridge, in the County of Worcester and Commonwealth of Massachusetts, in consideration of Two Thousand Six Hundred Dollars, paid by Bronja Cardeiro and Richard L Cardeiro of 219 Tessier Lane, Northbridge, MA, the receipt of which is hereby acknowledged, does sell and convey to said Bronja Cardeiro and Richard L. Cardeiro, that certain cemetery Lot Number 3, two graves situated on the way called Yew Ave South, in the Pine Grove Cemetery, and the sole and exclusive right of burial of the dead therein, subject to the following rules and restrictions for the regulation and government of said Cemetery; viz:

- 1st. That the said Lot shall not be used for any other purpose than as a place of burial for the dead, and proper Cemetery uses, such as the Town may approve; and no trees within the Lot or the Cemetery shall be cut down or destroyed without consent of the Town.
- 2nd. That if any trees or shrubs in said Lot shall become in any way detrimental to the adjacent lots or avenues, or dangerous or inconvenient, the Town shall have the right to enter into said Lot and remove said trees or shrubs, or such parts thereof as are dangerous, detrimental or inconvenient.
- 3rd. That if any monument or other structure whatever, or any inscription, be placed in the said Lot which shall be determined by the Town to be offensive, the Town shall have the right to enter upon said Lot and remove said offensive or improper object or objects.
- 4th. If a fence shall at any time be erected or placed in or around said Lot, the materials or design of which shall not be approved by the Town, it must be forthwith removed upon direction of the Town, and if not so removed the Town shall have the right to enter upon said Lot and remove said fence.
 - 5th. The said lot shall be holden subject to all by-laws, rules and regulations made and to be made by the Town.

IN WITNESS WHEREOF, the said Town of Northbridge has caused these presents to be signed and sealed by its Board of Selectmen, this 9th day of May, in the year of our Lord Two Thousand Twenty-Two.

Town Manager's Report for the Period of April 25, 2022 – May 6, 2022



1. Key Meetings Attended:

- Monday, April 25, 2022 Attended the Board of Selectmen Meeting.
- <u>Tuesday, April 26, 2022</u> Met with IT Director Scott Motyka and Help, Inc. regarding media improvements in the First Floor Conference Room.
- Wednesday, April 27, 2022 Held a Public Forum to present the Annual Ballot Questions (Fire Station, Civil Service, and Charter Amendments) and answer any resident questions.
- Friday, April 29, 2022 Held a Department Head Meeting to prepare for Town Meeting.
- Friday, April 29, 2022 Met with the Town Moderator and Staff to prepare for Town Meeting.
- Monday, May 2, 2022 Participated in a weekly Fire Station Project call.
- Monday, May 2, 2022 Attended a Cable Advisory Meeting.
- Monday, May 2, 2022 Attended the BPCC Meeting to discuss the Fire Station bids.
- Tuesday, May 3, 2022 Attended and presented at the Spring Annual Town Meeting.
- Wednesday, May 4, 2022 Attended a Library Trustees Meeting.
- 2. **Fire Station Project**: The General bids were received last week on Thursday, April 28th. The low bid was submitted by M. O'Connor, approximately \$576,000 under what was expected. The BPCC voted this past Monday to award the bid to M. O'Connor pending all Town approvals, contract documents, and a Notice to Proceed. The Spring Annual Town Meeting voted this past Tuesday to approve an additional \$3,755,182 in borrowing for the project contingent upon the Ballot Question for the Debt Exclusion passing on May 17, 2022.
- 3. Northbridge Elementary School Reuse Study: The architect team from Abacus is performing initial due diligence and is beginning the market analysis. They will be meeting with several key stakeholders in the next week or two before conducting a public meeting with BPCC on initial thoughts.
- 4. **Fire Department Radio Communications Study**: Chief White and Chief Labrie are working with the firm CTA on the project which is on-going.
- 5. **Fire Department Strategic Plan:** The Fire Chief and staff continue to work with the consultant CPSM for this project which is on-going.
- 6. <u>American Rescue Plan Act (ARPA)</u>: Now that the recommended Funding Project Plan has been approved, projects are able to move forward. The Town Manager is putting together contracts with the non-profits and departments will need to coordinate necessary procurements.
- 7. **FY2023 Budget and SATM Warrant:** The Spring Annual Town Meeting was held this past Tuesday, May 3, 2022 with approximately 75 registered voters attending. All 21 articles were approved overwhelmingly (Article 22 was passed over). The Annual Election will be held on Tuesday, May 17, 2022 with 4 ballot questions as well as elections for boards and committees.
