Know all Men by These Presents,



That the Town of Northbridge, in the County of Worcester and Commonwealth of Massachusetts, in consideration of One Thousand Six Hundred Dollars, paid by Gerald Lee Gaudette, III, of 124 Eben Chamberlain Road, Northbridge (Whitinsville), MA, the receipt of which is hereby acknowledged, does sell and convey to said Gerald Lee Gaudette, III that certain cemetery Lot No. 15B, a single grave situated on the way called Meadow Path, in the Pine Grove Cemetery, and the sole and exclusive right of burial of the dead therein, subject to the following rules and restrictions for the regulation and government of said Cemetery; viz:

- 1st. That the said Lot shall not be used for any other purpose than as a place of burial for the dead, and proper Cemetery uses, such as the Town may approve; and no trees within the Lot or the Cemetery shall be cut down or destroyed without consent of the Town.
- 2nd. That if any trees or shrubs in said Lot shall become in any way detrimental to the adjacent lots or avenues, or dangerous or inconvenient, the Town shall have the right to enter into said Lot and remove said trees or shrubs, or such parts thereof as are dangerous, detrimental or inconvenient.
- 3rd. That if any monument or other structure whatever, or any inscription, be placed in the said Lot which shall be determined by the Town to be offensive, the Town shall have the right to enter upon said Lot and remove said offensive or improper object or objects.
- 4th. If a fence shall at any time be erected or placed in or around said Lot, the materials or design of which shall not be approved by the Town, it must be forthwith removed upon direction of the Town, and if not so removed the Town shall have the right to enter upon said Lot and remove said fence.
 - 5th. The said lot shall be holden subject to all by-laws, rules and regulations made and to be made by the Town.

Name Change for the Senior Center



BLACKSTONE RIVER CANAL

As it traverses its 45 mile route from Worcester mass to Providence RI, the Blackstone River descends 451 ½ feet, releasing energy with every inch as it drops. In the 1790's entrepreneurs sought to harness the river's energy, initially establishing mills to spin cotton thread and using the river to power the machinery. With the multiplication of spinning mills in the Blackstone Valley, farmlands were pushed back, and eventually the village emerged as a model of social organization. Although the manufacturing revolution worked its way through the valley in the first decades of the 18th century, the rapids and falls of the Blackstone conspired against the budding industrialists. Trade patterns did not move along the river as it was too difficult to transport goods upon it. The Blackstone Mill owners looked to the construction of a canal to speed the movement of raw materials and finished goods, AND to lower the cost of freight. It wasn't until 1796 that the idea of building a canal to improve north-south transportation thought the valley was first raised. The merchants of Boston side tracked the idea though, fearing that the Worcester-Providence trade route would not be in their best interest. In 1828 the canal was completed, connecting Worcester to providence as well as the numerous villages throughout the Blackstone Valley. Although the canal era was short lived it bonded the mill villages with the economic centers of the Worcester and Providence and the course of the canal furnished the route for the next technology, the railroad.

PLUMMER'S LANDING

Lock #25—The Whitinsville Lock of the Blackstone Canal is part of the bridge on Church Street extension where the road crosses the canal. This area, which is named for the landowner and businessman who owned the land throughout most of the 19th century: Israel Plummer

Israel Plummer was the eldest of eleven children, born to Ebenezer and Pamela Plummer in Thompson, CT, in 1810 (Could not find how or when he arrived in Northbridge)

In 1836, Israel Plummer, a young, enterprising—and subsequently successful businessman built a store beside a boat basin and dock in the area known then as Intervale—to us, Plummer's Landing. Approximately mid-way on the canal between Worcester and Providence, Plummer's Landing became an important commercial center, receiving manufactured goods from the cities and mill villages and agricultural products from the rural countryside. Goods shipped from Plummer's landing included textiles, lumber, wood shingles, cut stone and machinery. Israel Plummer was one of the largest users of the canal in the Blackstone Valley and when the canal era ended in 1848, the enterprising businessman opened a depot and shipped goods on the Worcester and Providence Railroad. Aside from Paul Whitin and sons, Israel Plummer was one of the largest taxpayers in town. His holdings included 10 acres in the Intervale area, Plummer Granite Co., one engine, tools, three houses, the depot, a store to barns, and 50 acres of land (taxes paid in 1847--\$11,050)



Unfortunately, I was unable to find any kind of picture or likeness of Israel Plummer. However in the March 4, 1981 edition of the Blackstone Valley Tribune, Alice Hall, a resident of Upton, who personally knew Israel Plummer, described him as being "a tall, commanding figure with a ruddy complexion and white side whiskers. He wore a cape-coat in winter and frequently a high silk hat. He also carries a gold-headed cane." (Sounds like quite the 19th century gentleman ~ photo resemblance only) Israel Plummer was described as a leader in social and civic affairs. He was a faithful member and participant of the Worcester Musical Association; and he served as a director for many years. He often gave Temperance lectures, which were quite popular at that time. He served as a town official for many years. According to Town Meeting Reports from 1836-1880, Israel had served for 41 years, holding no fewer than 58 town government positions (sometimes 3 or 4 at the same time). His first position, in 1836, he was the Measurer of Wood, a role he served in for many years. He was the Sealer of Weights & Measures. Served on the School Committee and was a Highway Surveyor. (Jim & Jaime would love to know there were ELEVEN Highway Surveyors appointed each year throughout the 1850's)



At two different times, Israel served as Assessor. In 1851 he was the Viewer of Fences and served as a Selectman at four different times: 1839, 1848, 1853 and 1854. He was on the list of Jurors from 1851-1877. By 1877, it appears Israel stepped away from town service. Yet he did compose a writing of the first history of the Blackstone Canal, which he delivered to the Worcester Society of Antiquity in 1878. After the death of his wife in 1875, Israel moved to his daughter, Sarah Knowlton's home in Upton, where he later died in 1888.



The Northbridge Senior Center is presently located in the former Plummer School 1921-1982. Interestingly, this building is not the first Plummer School. The original school was located at the site of the old Plummer Depot, down near the railroad. The "new" Plummer School was initially built as a two classroom school, expanded to six classrooms (two on the first level and four on the second floor).



The Plummers School

The picture here is that of the old Plummers School scholars. Maybe you are in it.

Certainly the man is who loaned the photo to me for this occasion. His name is Joseph Garabedian of Garabedian Bros. Clothing store, Church Street. He is the fifth boy from the left, in the second row from the top. The tall girl behind him is Hester Deane, and the boy next to him is his brother Charles.

The girl behind him is a colored girl, and the first and third boy from the left, same row as the Garabedian brothers, are her brothers.

As I remember it, Mr. Garabedian said the boy on his right was John Deane. He did say Katrina Duhamell (Bakker) was also on the picture, but I forget where. He also pointed out a William Smith, some of whose brothers, sisters and cousins I knew quite well, later.

Hester Deane worked in Daley's Store, Uxbridge when I worked at Draper's, Hopedale. We would get on the same electric car at Uxbridge Center, I getting off at Linwood and she going on to Plummers' Corner.

John, I got to know later. He called me frequently with reference to the pictures used with my Tribune articles. On occasion, he, very kindly, let me use his. I took him to several of my slide shows, when he became unable to get around.

Along with his confinement he developed a sense of importance that one just couldn't help notice.

A handwritten notice pinned to the door said "ring bell and walk in." John was a very good photographer and many of his pictures were used by the old Whitin "Spindle."

The school teacher of the group, by the way, was, according to Mr. Garabedian, a Miss Devlin.

I know less about this school than any of the

tracks to the right of the road. On that site, on the 1849 map of Northbridge, a building is indicated as "Plummers' Depot."

Whether that building was taken down and replaced by the school building we are not certain. In any case, there is a picture of the school on page 73 of the Northbridge Bicentennia 1 Commemorative Journal, titled "Plummer, 1870," the date presumably when it was built.

The School Report for 1912 has this interesting note: "The new building at Plummers was finished in time for the opening of the fall term and was immediately filled by the children of that village, who have heretofore attended at the old building in that district or at Rockdale."

After the new school was erected at the end of Highland Street and Church Street it is safe to say, I think, that the old Plummers School, the picture of which we show, was taken down.

Reflection

Several times while looking at the picture, Mr. Garabedian would mumble something that was deep, yet very vivid, in his memory - something he reiterated from time to time, something with awesomeness and wonderment as he reflected on the simple and terrifying thought he could neither understand nor speak a word of English.

A great barrier, indeed, but which in time he came to recognize as a challenge. He overcame it as he did others that followed. Today Mr. Garabedian stands as a living symbol of the oft quoted immigrant who started business in a hole in the wall and wound up owning the building.

Report of School Physician

"the new building at Plummers etc., etc.)" many other items attracted our attention which we felt were worth passing along. We were very much impressed with the care and consideration given the health of the children. In this particular report the physician was Dr. Charles H. Harriman. He addressed his report to the School Committee of Northbridge. Very briefly, here it is:

Gentlemen:

The school physician again most heartily congratulates the town of Northbridge upon the splendid physical condition in which he found the pupils of our schools at the annual medical examination for the present year. With the assistance of the district nurse, 1,454 pupils were thoroughly examined. Of course, among such a large number of children of school age there must of necessity be some having a physical defect of some kind, but the number was extremely small as the following list will show." In addition to the list there were 231 cases of enlarged tonsils, 56 of which needed an operation. "Of the 1,454 pupils examined, 704 had one or more badly decayed teeth; most had from five to ten."

"Parents should see that all physical defects existing in their children are remedied before the little ones begin their school life, for young children are more susceptible to disease than older ones. When a child enters school for the first time it is the beginning of its future usefulness to itself, its parents and its country. How great that usefulness may be depends mostly upon its parents..."

The foregoing is history, but it impressed the writer with the tremendous care and consideration the school and the town authorities give to the pupils' health as well as their education.

Shortly after its closing, with funding from the Town, grants awarded and assistance from FINE (Friends of Northbridge Elders), students from BVT (Blackstone Valley Tech) renovated the building. In 1985 the Northbridge Senior center relocated from the small storefront on Church Street to the present location at 20 Highland Street.





At the August 18, 2020 Council on Aging meeting, the Board voted unanimously to rename our building:

Plummer Place - Home of the Northbridge Senior Center

Tonight, on behalf the COA Board, Staff and FINE, we are asking for your support and approval of this name change.


Trivia:
